**15,17,7**

China will launch 15 rockets, 17 satellites and the Shenzhou VII space craft in 2008, the Commission of Science Technology and Industry for National Defense (COSTIND) said on 7 January. Secretary General of the COSTIND said the Shenzhou VII, the country's third manned space mission, is a major task for the year.

**9,000**

More than 9,000 air passengers were stranded and 105 flights delayed due to a heavy fog that blanketed Chengdu, Sichuan's provincial capital, on 8 January. The fog cut visibility at Chengdu's Shuangliu International Airport to less than 50 meters, far below the 550 meters and 800 meters required for planes to take off and land, respectively.

**14**

People who drink moderately, exercise, quit smoking and eat five servings of fruit and vegetables each day live on average 14 years longer than people who adopt none of these behaviors, researchers said.

**5,000,000**

China granted its State Scientific and Technological Award for 2007 to petrochemical scientist Min Enze and botanist Wu Zhengyi for progress in technological innovation. Chinese President Hu Jintao presented them each with 5 million RMB (600,000 USD) awards at the annual national science-technology award ceremony at the Great Hall of the People.

**73**

With rapid developments in both living standards and in the health care industry, the average life expectancy for Chinese is now 73 years, up from 71.4 just eight years ago. A report by China's Ministry of Health attributes the rise to China's rapid development in health care.

**45.8%**

Chinese Web users will spend 45.8% more this year on online games and booking hotel and flight tickets, among other services available online, as China overtakes the United States as the world's largest Internet market by Web population size. Total spending by Chinese Internet users will hit 581.5 billion RMB (77.53 billion USD), while the Web population will hit 244 million by the end of 2008, an increase of 34% from last year's 182 million, reported the Internet Society of China.

**11**

Manabu Fukushima, a 71 year old resident of Onga in Fukuoka prefecture, Japan, has gained attention for harvesting 11 distinct types of fruit from the same tree growing in his garden. The 30-year-old lemon tree has been receiving grafts from other citrus tree saplings for about 15 years. It typically takes one to three years for successful grafts to take hold and actually begin producing fruit.

**80%**

Workers in about 80% of China's foreign-funded and private enterprises will form trade unions by the end of the year. The All-China Federation of Trade Unions aims to unionize 70 million migrant workers in the secondary and tertiary industries to help the working class to be better organized, Federation executive vice-chairwoman Sun Chunlan said.

**6.9**

An earthquake measuring 6.9 on the Richter scale hit western Tibet at 16:26 local time, 9 January 2008, according to the China Seismological Monitoring Network. No casualties have been reported, possibly because the region is remote, sparsely populated, and at an elevation of more than 4,000m.

**2,000,000**

After a four-year study, Chinese experts concluded the Three Gorges area on the Yangtze River to be 2,000,000 years old. The discovery is expected to be used in environmental pollution and geographical disaster control in the Three Gorges area, which was once all hills and valleys cut through by the Yangtze.

**10**

The 2007-2008 top 10 brands in the Chinese consumer electronics industry were unveiled on 10 January at the 41st International Consumer Electronics Show. Haier, Hisense, Changhong, TCL, Lenovo, Great Wall, Tongfang, BOE, Desai and Asustek made the list, which has been dubbed the Oscars of China's consumer electronics industry. The top 10 brands were chosen for obtaining 3 million votes by Chinese consumers and retailers via the Internet, and selected by a 50-expert panel.

**1<sup>st</sup>**

China has released the world's first Tibetan-language office software in an effort to facilitate the use of computers among Tibetans. The newly released Neo-shine Tibet Office 3.0, jointly developed by China Standard Software Corporation and Tibet University, will push the development of Tibet's information industry. The office software is expected to replace Microsoft Office, which was previously widely used in Tibetan-speaking regions, but requires additional plug-ins for the use of the Tibetan language.

**100,000,000**

Rare 100-million-year-old organic turtle remains were discovered by a local resident in a river in Pingdingshan City, Henan Province, on 3 January. The remains are around 15 centimeters long and seven centimeters wide, and weigh one kilogram. The fossil still has all four limbs and its tail, but lacks a head.

**13**

Tianjin Public Security 110 (Alarm Service Station) celebrated its 13th anniversary on 10 January 2008. Now the emergency hotline offers support in 4 foreign languages: English, Japanese, Korean and Spanish.

**25.5%**

China's total logistics flow in 2007 grew 25.5% to 74.8 trillion RMB (10.27 trillion USD), according to the estimates of the China Federation of Logistics and Purchasing. China's demand for modern logistics continued to increase due to fast economic growth, with the logistics demand elastic coefficient (GDP to total logistics flow) in 2007 rising to 3.2 from 2.8 in 2006.

**2,000**

On 29 December, China's top legislature adopted an amendment to raise the country's individual monthly minimum income tax threshold from 1,600 RMB to 2,000 RMB. The increase is believed to relieve the economic burden of middle and low-income earners amid the recent price increases of some goods. The amendment takes effect on 1 March 2008.













## India-China relations in good shape

The Times of India, 14 January

The primary news source in India, The Times of India, threw its focus on China following a three-day visit there by Prime Minister Manmohan Singh, according to whom India-China relations are in "very good shape" and negotiations are underway to resolve the "complicated" border issue. India challenges China's attempt to sidestep an existing agreement to keep populated areas out of border dispute settlements, and seeks to revive the stalled border designation process. China offers to support India's bid for a permanent seat in the United Nations Security Council. Conversations during the visit satisfied both countries. It seems that the dragon and the elephant have finally turned from competition to cooperation.

## How can Chinese firms "score" in overseas markets?

Global Entrepreneur, 17 January

The leading business magazine in China, Global Entrepreneur, shares with its readers the secrets to success when developing in overseas markets. Key indicators for success are communication, brand building and technology development. Global Entrepreneur believes that communication is the best way to resolve cultural conflicts and develop the best strategies for operation. It notes that most Chinese firms lack sufficient knowledge on brand building, which is important to sustainable development. The magazine also asserted that increasing the level of product technology will help Chinese firms become masters of their markets.

## China's great grab

Chicago Tribune, 16-19 December

In its special report, the Chicago Tribune talks about how China's exploding appetite for natural resources is reshaping the world. *Your cheap sweater's real cost* explains that the enormous production of cashmere sweaters not only results in grassless prairies in China but also pollutes the air on the other side of the world. And *The hidden cost of your hardwood floor* points out that the demand for Chinese goods is driving destructive logging around the globe. Although the Chinese government has established strict logging criteria, it has yet to effectively stop illegal timber trade. The Chicago Tribune is also concerned that competition for oil will soon arise from China's roaring economic growth. It is up to China to decide whether its reshaping is in a globally favourable direction or not.

## A delicate condition

The Economist, 17 January

The Economist focused on global inflation this January. Global inflation is rising even as the world economy is slowing down. At 6.9%, China's inflation rate is at its highest in 11 years. Commodity prices create a direct link between China and inflationary pressure; the cost of many raw materials has surged in the past 12 months. The Chinese government has been imposing various price controls over the past weeks out of concerns of social unrest, the effectiveness of which has yet to be observed. Are policymakers still worried? Academic research suggests that low, stable inflation expectations are the main difference between today and the 1970s. But if overall price pressures remain elevated, the government has to face the unenviable task of curtailing or even raising rates while the economy is weak.

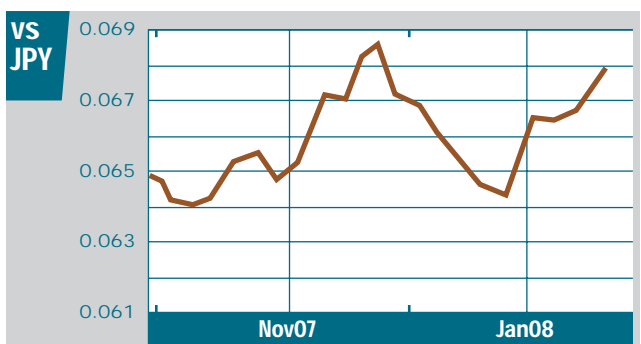
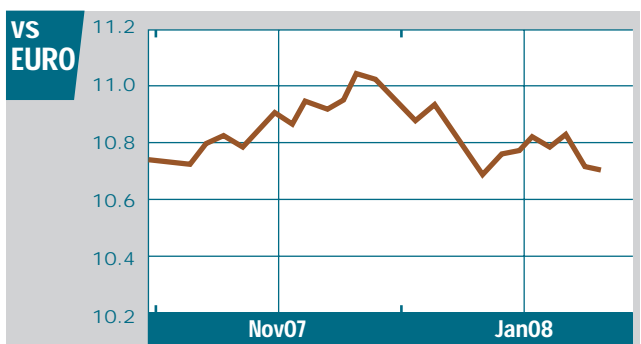
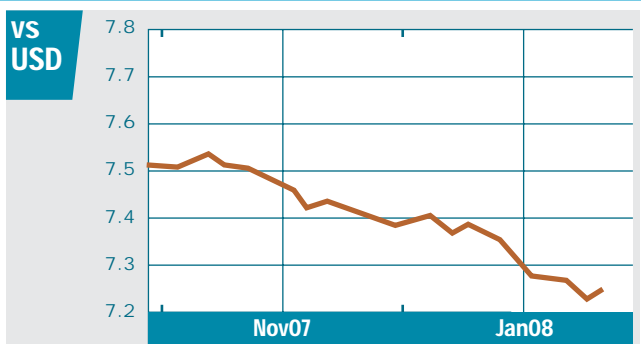

# Three Month CNY Trends



## USD

Due to the Federal Reserve continuously cutting interest rates, the CNY's relative appreciation has accelerated. Since the emergency 0.75% rate cut on 22 January 2008, the CNY to USD exchange rate has decreased continuously, breaking 7.21 on 25 January. International markets expect that the Federal Reserve will likely cut interest rates again, so the exchange rate trend should continue in the short term. This could lead more short-term international capital flow into China, exacerbating China's excess currency problem and boosting the stock and real estate markets.

## EURO

One offshoot of the American subprime lending crisis and Federal Reserve interest rate cuts is a falling Euro to CNY exchange rate after a December 2007 rise. But following an increasing European economy, the Euro to CNY exchange rate felt a slight move upward in January 2008. The European Central Bank said that regardless of the influence of America's economy on the Euro, the Bank's greatest concern is battling inflation through increasing interest rates, not decreasing them to meet the slow economic growth. However, the American subprime lending crisis may in fact keep the European Central Bank from increasing interest rates. A rising Euro is beneficial for China's economic development.

## GBP

Britain's weak economy has resulted in continuous GBP to CNY rate drops. Since last August, British real estate has experienced a continuous decline. The GBP to CNY exchange rate may continuously fall, which could negatively influence China's economy.

## JPY

Japan's economic development has progressed steadily as of late. But as a result of the cost of crude oil and Japan's New Construction Benchmark Law, the CNY exchange rate to Japanese Yen experienced an overall rise. Some analysts expect the CNY to JPY rate will continuously increase, though it will not significantly affect China's economy.

On 16 March 2007, the National People's Congress of the PRC passed the new Corporate Income Tax (CIT) Law. The Law represents a milestone in China's taxation history and provides a fundamental change in China's tax incentive policy in order to shape and direct the future economic development of the nation. It adopts various international tax principles and practices, at the same time having certain tax rules bearing closer resemblance to the new Chinese accounting standards.

Given the widespread implications of the new CIT Law to foreign investors' operations in China, it is important for management to carefully analyse these impacts and design appropriate strategies to meet the changes. Certain business re-alignment and proactive planning may also be necessary.

## LOBBY SUCCESSES

### • Release of the 2007/ 2008 European Business in China Position Paper

On 11 September 2007, the European Chamber of Commerce held a press conference for the release of the 2007/2008 Position Paper, a publication aimed at providing the most up-to-date industry analysis of the business environment in China.

Amongst the foreign media covering the event were the Associated Press, Reuters, Spiegel Online, the Wall Street Journal, AFP and AFX Asia. The Chinese media was represented by CCTV 9, Biz China, China Business News and China Daily. After the press conference, the following key messages were delivered by the media:

- Neither the EU nor China can benefit from trade protectionism.
- IPR violations still remain a major concern for European investors.
- According to the Chinese media, EU-China trade is not extensive or balanced enough. The key message delivered through European media was that China needs to further open up markets and lift trade barriers.
- European media highlighted the fact that the business environment is becoming more complex and that Chinese bureaucracy upsets western companies.
